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need--a sympathetic shoulder to just go cry it all out, then come back and look at the reality. But you asked what could you do with all of these problems. That's where the song comes in, and if Senator Bourne had courage, he'd join me: (singing) "Get a Job." Okay, go work for somebody else. Let them pay you minimum wage. But not a soul on this floor would want to work for minimum wage, not one, and not one would take a minimum wage job, not one. You know what's going to hurt the rural community? They do not have good spokespersons. They have people who want to whine and try to make people feel sorry for them, and all the people who don't live in the rural area will know, and they're not going to distinguish, by the way, between farmers and people who live in a rural setting, like a small town. They're all the same and they're all getting handouts. They're all getting subsidies. They're all getting paid by the government, so there's not going to be any sympathy. And rural people think that's so unfair. Why can't people understand? I think it's unfair when you all don't want to realize that people who have nothing to sell but their labor are cast aside so casually. But I'm not going to let this matter go. If I'm the only one speaking on the floor, I'm going to keep speaking about it and speaking about it until my soul is relieved. What I wish could happen is that a comment Senator Janssen made could be made a reality. He said something about walking in somebody else's shoes. Most people who say that are implying, as Senator Cunningham was, that if a person lived the life he or she is living, he or she would see things the same way. Not necessarily. If the person were you, the person would see it the same way, but there are others who would not see it that way. If I were like my colleagues, I'd be like a knot on a log and grumbling and tired without participating in the activities on the floor at all, but though I'm the oldest man here you don't see me sitting around in my chair all day long talking about how hard this job is, doing nothing but going out and sponging off the lobbyists so much that they call me "Captain Lunch Hunter"; every time they look up, there I am. And they have one of these little punches, Senator Vrtiska, that will punch a clean round hole in leather, so that when you have to let your belt out another notch you don't have to buy another belt. They just punch a hole so that you can let that belt out to accommodate that increased girth that develops from sponging
