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things ten times. You know what our farm colleagues used to do, Senator Stuthman? This was before your time, so listen up, sonny. (Laugh) That makes people feel good. They used to take milk and pour it out, when there were babies who did not have milk. And why did they pour it out? Was it spoiled? No. Was it fit for human consumption? Yes. Why did they pour it out? To try to raise prices. They did it for money, when there were babies who needed milk? Oh, yes, they did. That's the nature of the American farmer. They'd take butter and cheese and spoil it so that it would be unfit for human consumption. Why? To raise prices. And then they'd take those big animals with the soft, trusting brown eyes, who did nothing but go moo and give milk, and you know what those rascals did? They took weapons and slaughtered those animals, killed them. Why? To raise prices. That is what the American farmer has been about. And for a little history lesson, when George Washington and his troops were around Valley Forge, the farmers were gouging them, and would not make certain products and produce available until he signed a paper that would pay them far more than it's worth, because the American farmer saw a chance to jack up the government. You talk about supporting your troops. Well, you go back to what Americans had done, and they've never supported their troops when it was that classification of people who made money. They never have. But they've supported war when they could derive a profit. Go back and read your history. Not about George Washington never telling a lie, or cutting down a cherry tree, or trying to throw a dollar across the Potomac, or standing up on a little boat when he should have been sitting down. There's more to the story than that. But...

SENATOR VRTISKA: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...they don't want you to know it. So I wanted Brother Stuthman to know that the food stamp program is a subsidy program for agriculture, and that's why it's in the Department of Agriculture. And if they did add \$2 billion more, it's because some farm area senators got that added to it. And that money doesn't come to poor people in the ghettos, on the reservations, or in the depressed rural areas. It goes to farmers. And the bigger you are and the less need you have for help, the more of it you take in. And I want anybody who
