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SENATOR HARTNETT: That's all the change it makes.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: That's all the change, yes.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Where is the change in the bill, Senator Pederson?

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Just a moment, if you'd give me a moment. Let me check the statute just a moment. The current statute provides, and it's 44-2841, that the panel is made up of one attorney and three physicians.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Shouldn't have...shouldn't be two attorneys and two physicians, kind of make it even? (Laugh)

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: That would probably just compound the problem, Senator, and protract the process.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Thank you, Senator Pederson. I'll give the rest of my time to Senator Preister.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Hartnett and Pederson. Senator Preister, you have two minutes and 20 seconds.

SENATOR PREISTER: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Hartnett. I'll just finish the rest of the story, as Paul Harvey said. Anyway, when the biopsy came back that there was cancer on the edge of the tissue that was removed, they wanted to ensure that there wasn't any still left and so they wanted to operate again. So I had to go back through the procedure, have the second operation, and fortunately, when the operation biopsy came back, there wasn't any. So they really didn't have to do the operation. So the additional cost, the expense, all of that was there and it was for naught. It was insurance and I was glad that it happened, but I have a lot less skin as a result of that, because this time they took way more than they needed and that wasn't necessarily good for me, the point being, had the skin been marked in the first place, had we known where it was taken from, had that mistake not been made, they would only have had to have gone to that section of the skin. They wouldn't have had to take it all the way around and take way more than
