even they knew wasn't necessary. So it would have saved me the problem and...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR PREISTER: ...it would have been much better all the way around. I could have sued. I chose not to. And what part of my point is, that most people don't sue. In fact, the vast majority of people who experience these types of mistakes may not even think about or consider suing. So we don't...and in Nebraska we really don't have a sue-happy state. People here tend to respect the medical profession. They tend to accept their judgment. I know of other instances in the family and with friends where there have been serious breaches of medical practices and ethics where people did not sue. Nebraskans and in Nebraska we don't have that serious a problem with lawsuits and litigation. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Preister. Senator Aguilar.

SENATOR AGUILAR: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members. I rise in support of most of this bill. I have a question about part of it and my question came about because of something Senator Preister says in talking about medical errors and stuff. At the last conference I attended, I don't think I'll mention where, we heard from a medical professional that stated that most of the malpractice errors are committed by only 3 percent of the doctors, 3 percent of the doctors. However, whenever there's a raise in malpractice insurance, all the doctors have to pay for that. And I guess I'd like to ask Senator Don Pederson a question.
