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information, be provided up front, so that all the students, parents, so on, could understand what it is that...what could be expected of them in terms of providing both money and other specific attire and so on. So I think I have covered there some of the main...some of the key provisions. I would request your adoption of the committee amendments, and certainly be willing to answer any questions you might have. Thank you very much.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Raikes. You've heard the opening on AM0931, which is an amendment to LB 249. Mr. Clerk.

ASSISTANT CLERK: Mr. President, the first amendment to the committee amendments is offered by Senator Stuhr. This is AM1105. (Legislative Journal page 1196.)

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Stuhr, you're recognized to open on AM1105, which is to an amendment...to the committee amendment.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. This is really a very short amendment. And what it does is place the emergency clause on the bill. It would be very helpful to have schools to be able to deal with this issue yet this year. And then also on page 6, line 7, we are inserting...and that is in the fee bill...the one word "maximum." No fee, specialized equipment or attire, or nonspecialized attire may be required unless the maximum dollar amount of the fee is listed and approved by the board. The reason that we wish to insert that "maximum" is that a school may have a number of, oh, let's say choirs, and they would...the school would look over and decide what might be the maximum amount that that school might use on uniforms or something. And that way they wouldn't have to do it for each individual team or whatever they might have. In the larger schools, this is certainly an issue. In the smaller schools, it would not. So with that, I ask your support of this amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Stuhr. You've heard the opening on AM1105, which is an amendment to the committee amendments. (Visitors introduced.) On with discussion of the Stuhr amendment, Senator Janssen, followed by Senators Brown, Chambers, Stuhr, Price, Hartnett, and Schimek. Senator Janssen.
