SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Raikes, I think I understand. This is brought by the schools, by the school districts. And they want to hide specific disclosure. I'm not so naive, and they shouldn't think I'm so stupid that I would buy the...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...notion that they want this in here because they might change a fee in the middle of the year and that would have to require them to change their whole fee schedule. Just don't let them change fees in the middle of the year. Couldn't that be what we would say instead, that fees, once announced, cannot be changed in the middle of a school year? Wouldn't that even be fair? And then we don't have to put "maximum" in there. Because neither your explanation nor Senator Stuhr's convinced me of anything other than that this is an attempt to dodge stating specifically what a fee is for a particular activity. I don't see where that's too hard to do if we're talking about disclosure. If we're talking about music, if the fee is \$20, why don't we put \$20? And I'm...I sound argumentative, but I'm just frustrated because I'm having so much trouble understanding what this is for. If we don't do it, what is the problem? And I think my time is...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...out, so I'll turn my light on again.

SENATOR CUDABACK: It is up, Senator Chambers. Thank you. (Visitors introduced.) On with the discussion of the Stuhr amendment, Senator Stuhr.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I'd like to respond to Senator Chambers' question again, in attempt to clarify that amendment. There is no intent to change fees in the middle of the year. Each school adopts policies that must include the fee amount at the beginning of the year.
