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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Stuhr,...

SENATOR STUHR: I don't know.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...I'm not saying...

SENATOR STUHR: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What I'm saying is that the examples that they gave to you, which you're giving to us, don't make sense to me. I don't see the need for this. So maybe I'm just dense. But I'm going to keep working and try to see if I can come to an understanding.

SENATOR STUHR: All right. If I may, ...do I...

SENATOR CUDABACK: You may.

SENATOR STUHR: ...have some time left?

SENATOR CUDABACK: You have about a minute and a half, Senator Stuhr.

SENATOR STUHR: All right. Thank you, Mr. President. I did want to make some clarification on the student option issue. As I mentioned in my opening...and possibly some of you were not here...the original student option enrollment bill was passed in 1989. It did accommodate 180 days for ineligibility for a transfer from one district to another. In 1990, that was changed to 90 days. But also, there was this waiver opportunity for both schools to sign a waiver. What we are doing in this bill...and this is in response to...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR STUHR: ...Senator Brown's question on whether we need this bill...is that in January of 2002, the proposal to eliminate the enrollment option waiver was passed 226 by 33 margin by member high school districts. They are in support of this legislation. And I also wanted to share with you that
