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SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR RAIKES: ...say that student were a football player. This rule would prohibit them from playing football, because...and I think this is a point of misunderstanding. Because at the hearing, the NSAA representative made the point, well, we have a rule that would cover that. But that's not the point. Because now it would be a matter of statute, and they can't have a rule that is inconsistent with statute. So this is the difficulty, I think, that you encounter in this sort of a thing. And it's been the...I think it's fair to say, it's been the opinion of the committee, so far at least, that we should move forward in spite of that.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, the more I hear people discuss this, the more incongruities there are in the law. I mean, it depends on the sport, it depends on the student's circumstance, it makes assumptions about student intention,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: What would be wrong with doing away with the 90-day rule and just getting rid of it?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Your time is up, Senator Beutler. I'm sorry. Senator Stuhr on the first component of the divided question.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. We are dealing with the emergency clause on this bill. And I would ask for your support. Are there speakers following me, Mr. President?

SENATOR CUDABACK: You are not closing. Yes.

SENATOR STUHR: All right.

SENATOR CUDABACK: There are other speakers following you.

SENATOR STUHR: But I am closing?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Oh, no, you are not yet.
