of the bill that deals with drug product selection and generic substitution. Those words are deleted as being unnecessary, and the federal law that this language is patterned after does not use the word "exactly." The amendment reorders wording of the drug product selection provisions as pointed out by Senator Chambers on General File, and finally, the bill permits a pharmacist to select a generic drug product for the brand name drug product unless the patient or the patient's representative or caregiver of the patient indicates otherwise. The amendment clarifies that the representative or caregiver is someone designated by the patient. I would ask for your adoption to the amendment. I would also mention that...mention to you, for your information, Senator Chambers has requested an Attorney General's Opinion on the one subject rule, and that is still before us and we're awaiting that decision. With that, I would just ask for adoption of this amendment. Thank you, Mr. President...Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Jensen. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, you all know that on occasion I can be critical, and I think when somebody has done something that I consider to be outstanding work, I should acknowledge that.
