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just make it easier.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Thank you, Senator Burling. And getting in the spirit of Senator Burling's responses, this could be one man who could do the work of three: Curly, Moe, and Larry. Those are the Three Stooges, for those who are too young to know. If this person has anything to offer that would be constructive, I don't know why somebody wouldn't want to let him work with them. He could do leg work, or the types of things that an inexperienced person would do while trying to learn the ropes. But if nobody wants to be bothered with him, we could reduce the number of hours to 500. But if...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...at some point a number of hours was decided on, after consultation or hearings or whatever is done to decide how this profession, if you want to call it that, is to function, that same process should be used if you're going to change those hours, because those in the profession may have some concerns about letting people in who don't meet the standards that ought to be met. I don't know what those standards ought to be. And that's why I wouldn't want to do it on the floor of the Legislature, with no guidance whatsoever, no hearing, no input from anybody other than one constituent who doesn't want to meet the requirements, and one Secretary of State who doesn't want to do his job. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. There are 10 further lights on. Senator Burling, you're recognized to close on your amendment.

SENATOR BURLING: Okay. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Thompson. Just a second. Senator Thompson, did you blink twice and it blinked off?

SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you. We're still trying to figure out...I'm getting conflicting information here on whether or not this amendment amends both plain clothes and private detectives. So I'm...I'll admit I'm confused. I just printed it off, and I
