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detective license.

SENATOR THOMPSON:    Okay.

SENATOR BURLING:     But, you know, if you have a question about that, I wouldn't challenge your question, because it's very easy to detect that as you study it.    And maybe Senator Brashear would like...would have a comment on that.

SENATOR THOMPSON:    Yeah.    Senator Brashear.

SENATOR CUDABACK:    Senator Brashear, would you respond to a question.

SENATOR BRASHEAR:    Yes, Mr. President.

SENATOR THOMPSON:    I'm referring to the committee amendment, page 3, about half-way down, Section 2 says, "The secretary shall issue to the person if qualified therefor..."

SENATOR CUDABACK:    One minute.

SENATOR THOMPSON:    "...a nontransferable license".    That section.

SENATOR BRASHEAR:    Yes, Senator Thompson.    I...

SENATOR THOMPSON:    And it refers to private detective, private detective agency, or a plain clothes investigator.    And then the amendment that Senator Burling has up is under Section 3 then, and says the...the licensee...he's changing that to "applicant"...shall be 21 years of age, on and on and on.    And that's where he adds the 1,500 hours.    So as I see it, that would then include that plain clothes investigator under Section 2.    I'm just doing this for purposes of clarification, because I want to make sure if...I'm not comfortable with the whole thing.    But if the body is comfortable with it, I think it better be clear that that's not modifying plain clothes investigators, who have no hourly requirement now.

SENATOR BRASHEAR:    I do not...
