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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Thompson on the Chambers amendment.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. President. I just would like to use this time to maybe set the stage for something that we need to do at some future time as a Legislature, regarding this industry. In working with representatives from the industry a few years ago on a number of issues that came out from the State Patrol task force that I chaired, it became clear to me that we probably need to do what we never like to do, and that is create another commission. But I do believe this industry should license itself. It should have a licensing board, as we do for so many other industries in the state, when it comes to setting standards, that that license fee would be sufficient to support it, so there would be no tax dollars supporting this licensing process. But I think if we put into place a licensing board process, we would be in a position to make decisions about what is appropriate and what the standards should be. And that...right now, the Secretary of State has a person who specializes in the area. He doesn't have an association per se, because the private detectives don't have associations; they have training groups. But formalize a process whereby people could advise the rules and regulations of the industry, and allow some standards to be set. And perhaps the 1,500-hour standard is the appropriate hour standard, Senator Burling, but I think at this point we don't have a process to work through those standards. And if we had had a licensing board for this industry, you would have been able to go there, and they could have taken this issue up and made some recommendations to the Secretary of State regarding the rules and regulations. So at some point, when we aren't in a budget crisis and we aren't dealing with a lot of other issues, I think we probably need to come back to the issue of whether or not this industry should be licensed by a board and have some standards set through a broader process than just the Secretary of State. SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Thompson. Senator Chambers. Senator Chambers, did you wish to...and this will be your third time, as you know.
