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about the Nebraska Capitol Commission, and how the Speaker fits into that, and how we will then fit into the various decisions that are made with respect to the Capitol building. But Section 13 of the bill, I think, well expresses the purpose of the commission, which is to provide the highest quality preservation, restoration, and enhancement of the State Capitol and State Capitol grounds, for the perpetual use by state government and the enjoyment of all persons. Now, I would never be one to suggest that each and every important function of the government should be focused upon the way that we are asking you to focus...to allow the bureaucracy to be oriented towards the Capitol building in this instance. Because of the legislative involvement, because of the judicial branch involvement, this commission, as you will recall, also includes the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, of course, who have a vital interest in the policies that relate to the State Capitol building. And it is appropriate, I think, that he also should have an enhanced say about what goes on in the Capitol building. One of the things that this amendment does is that it tends to treat as more equal the three branches of government, instead of saying with regard to this building, where we're all housed, that the executive branch shall have all of the final word. In any event, besides that adjustment of powers, it also would provide what I think is an appropriate highlighting of the Capitol building and its grounds. And I call it appropriate, not because this building and the grounds is the number-one aesthetic feature of Nebraska, in my opinion, but because it is in the opinion of, I think, most all Nebraskans. This is an incredibly beautiful building. It is recognized by architects worldwide as a treasure. And the care and the upkeep of it and the focus upon it, I think, are entirely appropriate, because it is such a one-of-a-kind thing. And so that is part of the purpose of getting together the Capitol Commission and empowering it to work with a specific administrator, whose duty, whose main focus, not part of his job, but whose main focus will be the care of the Capitol building and its grounds. So in defining that, the...it goes on to say that the office that's being created to administer the building will be subject to the advice of the Nebraska Capitol Commission. We've been very careful to be sure that no constitutional lines have been crossed. There are several questions that could come up with
