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demonstrated such powers of eyesight." As a practical matter, I anticipate very few people will use this method. She also spoke about records. The records check, which is sprinkled, references to which are sprinkled throughout the bill, number one, you have to consent to it and that will be on the application form. Once you consent to it, you get an FBI check. You have to submit your fingerprints, two copies. You get an NCIC check, you get a state check, and you get a mental health check. Now the county sheriff can't access mental health records; the State Patrol can and that's provided for. Now is this check going to find out everything that everybody has ever done? Of course not. What idiot in here thinks it would? What person is so unaware of real life as to think that we have a perfect set of records for anything. Maybe Senator Chambers thinks that, but he's not in touch with reality and he hasn't been for years. This bill refers to that records check a number of times within it. A good many of the objections that are raised in the letter from the Nebraska Sheriff's Association state what can be done, but it doesn't say the sheriff has to do it. It says the applicant has to do it, just like any other form that you fill out in any other sheriff's office in the state of Nebraska. He doesn't have to prove it; you have to prove it. Is this more restrictive than 28-1202 to return to a former line? Yes, it is. Anybody, even Senator Chambers, could carry a concealed gun. If he has...I think, Senator Thompson, were you attacking Senator Chambers? Does he have a weapon? Oh, that's all right. With a concealed carry permit, you have satisfied the requirements of the act and you are innocent until proven guilty. That is what some people refer to as the American way. Under 28-1202, where you have to mount an affirmative defense, you are guilty until proven innocent. That's the un-American way, the way that Senator Chambers must prefer. In any event,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR TYSON: ...if you want to have a Vermont-type situation here, and I introduced a bill to that effect about four years ago, and when Senator Chambers finished laughing they "IPPed" it in Judiciary Committee. I wasn't a member at that time. But there all you have to do is not carry a concealed weapon with
