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FLOOR DEBATE

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SENATOR TYSON: ...this knowledge may trigger a reluctance on the part of the sheriff's office to issue a permit, and provides grounds to deny the permit. The applicant may then go to court, as provided by this act. The matter is adjudicated by the court, but the sheriff has done his best and he has done his duty. Objection (e), has not been found in the past five years to be a mentally ill dangerous person, the records aren't open to the sheriff. They're open to the Nebraska State Patrol, as I mentioned previously when I was on the mike. Has been a resident of the county for 180 days; the sheriff doesn't have to go out and prove that or disprove that. The applicant has to prove it, just like you do any other time when you're answering questions in the sheriff's department. Has no known violation of the law; among other things, this is covered by the Nebraska State Patrol national criminal history check, which includes the state records and the mental health of HHS.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Tyson. (Visitors introduced.) On with discussion of the motion to recommit. Senator Erdman.
