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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Tyson, would you yield?

SENATOR TYSON: Yes. It would be possible.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So it's possible that we could have high school students carrying concealed weapons, and they couldn't carry it in school.

SENATOR TYSON: Certainly not in school.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Now how will you know that a person is not bringing a concealed weapon to school?

SENATOR TYSON: He can go through the same metal detector they have in the doors of some of the schools now, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What about the schools where they don't have metal detectors? Should they place them at all the schools to make sure that people coming there don't have concealed weapons?

SENATOR TYSON: That has nothing to do with this bill, Senator Chambers. They are discovering weapons on, not 21-year-old and older, they're discovering on 14 and 15 years older and that's...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay,...

SENATOR TYSON: ...in a place called Omaha.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...Fred Astaire. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers and Senator Tyson. The next speaker would be Senator Mossey.
