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SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR TYSON: ...is up to you. I'm here for your edification.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Schimek and Senator Tyson.  
Senator Mines.

SENATOR MINES: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Colleagues, there's...I noticed Senator...one of Senator Chambers' amendments is that it's 14...or FA1247 and it inserts, after the word "violence" on page 5, line 16, inserts "or antisocial behavior." And I would support moving that amendment forward, maybe for the support of the floor. Senator...if I could ask Senator Tyson a question.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Tyson.

SENATOR TYSON: Certainly.

SENATOR MINES: Senator Tyson, I've received, since this whole discussion began, I've received calls, mostly letters, from these organizations in opposition to concealed carry: the Douglas County Sheriff, Washington County Sheriff, the Police Officer Association of Nebraska, the Nebraska Police Chiefs Association, the Omaha Police Department, and I understand the Omaha Police Officers (sic) Union is neutral. Why would none of these organizations be in support of a concealed carry bill that we're discussing today?

SENATOR TYSON: Senator Mines, I think the best answer that I can give you is that I asked a state official of a police organization why he was testifying, this was two years ago, why he was testifying against this bill, and he said that's the position of the board. Now that same organization is neutral in this now, and I was discussing it with this particular individual and I said, what's your position? Well, the position of the board...I said, no, what's your position?

SENATOR MINES: He's down but he's not out. (Laughter)

SENATOR TYSON: That's merely Senator Hartnett. He wouldn't go over and break his own chair, oh no. He picked on...(Laughter)
