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state. A judge, even in his or her courtroom, cannot violate the laws of this state. Now I don't know who told you that, but I could get a judge disciplined for that and probably kicked off the bench. They are to abide by the Code of Judicial Conduct, all of the laws of the state, the Constitution of the United States, of the state of Nebraska, and all federal laws. So for you to stand on this floor and say that a judge can violate the state law in his or her courtroom is absolutely false.

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I thought...

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Erdman.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Mr. Speaker, I would yield my time to the able-bodied Senator Tyson.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Tyson, you have a little less than five minutes.

SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In response to what my young friend had to say, one of these days, and I don't know when and I don't want to be there because I wouldn't be able emotionally to handle it, but some day Senator Chambers is going to come into contact with a fast-moving, speeding reality, and I hate to see the carnage that results. Senator Chambers, and this is a rhetorical question...this is a rhetorical statement, there are a number of things going on out there in the real world, the world that you know not of, that are direct variance, and if you don't think that a judge rules in his chamber I would suggest that you go to law school, get a law degree, take the bar and kind of find out what's going on, because a judge does rule in his courtroom, Senator Chambers, and I know of a number of instances where they do and the one who originally told me that was a judge. He is not a judge now. He's retired. But he was, and when he was in his courtroom he commanded. What this bill does is it allows the responsible, law-abiding citizen to carry, legally, a concealed weapon for when he determines that it is necessary. He has to follow the strictures of this bill, and this is far stricter than most of the other carry states
