likely to change their behaviors. They're less likely to drive to Kansas or to Iowa or try to defeat it or look to the Internet. If you can get a low rate you don't have as much reason to change your behavior and try to defeat the tax. It's a good thing to have a broad tax and a low rate, and that general goal of Senator Brashear is one that I applaud. Now, we're going to have sort of a train wreck here on process, because I'm going to ask the Clerk to divide the committee amendment. And the reason I'm going to do that is so that we can take up one issue at a time and deal with it carefully. I also want to preserve the fact that the committee has done rather good work in technically making adjustments to LB 759. Now we struck some portions. In fact, we struck an important provision as far as Senator Brashear's concern, and that's the homes...the \$5,000 homestead and the \$1.10 levy, and that's something that he wants to talk about and it's appropriate to do so. But there's a rather good deal of agreement between the income tax and the cigarette tax pieces of this bill. I think there's largely a good amount of agreement on the sales tax provisions of this bill, but the committee did good work in changing definitions and solving technical problems. So I want to divide the committee amendment and have us adopt the committee amendment piece by piece, or amend it, as Senator Brashear would like us to, so that we can take up each piece individually. What I don't want to lose is some of the technical work that the committee did in improving the language. I would ask, by the way, for the Clerk to divide, essentially, the committee amendment into three subject areas: the cigarette and tobacco products portion; the income tax portion...by the way, I would interpret the cigarette and tax...tobacco tax to be Sections 1 and 13; I would do the income tax portion as Section 12; and I would do the sales tax portion, which are 2 through 11, and 14. And I would ask for permission to divide the question in that way.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Landis, just so we can kind of keep our process focused here, I'd like to have you approach, if you would, and also Senator Brashear, as the original introducer of the bill. Thank you, senators. The Clerk will explain and reaffirm what the division is on the committee amendments at this time. There may be a handout in a little bit, but if you'd
