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Iowa. We saw a diminution of Nebraska sales at the border and we saw an increase in sales in Iowa. It's true, there's been some border bleeding. However, Iowa is now considering a cigarette tax increase and it is an increase that would bring them back up to within one penny of where we are, and that is the best way of getting at the border bleeding problem--through the tax policy of Iowa, not Nebraska. We need the money and, in fact, Iowa is going to be in a position, I think, to bring to an end the border bleeding that was created by LB 1085 with respect to cigarettes. I do think that it's a fair characterization that out of the committee there is no desire at this point to go further. Although the Governor has wanted to increase cigarette taxes some more for revenue purposes, one of the reasons that bill is not out is because the committee is persuaded that the evidence of border bleeding is relatively significant. It's tolerable, we can live with it, but it would be exacerbated if the Governor's bill came out, which is why Senator Brashear's bill with respect to this measure is acceptable to a majority of the Revenue Committee. It was advanced. The Governor's bill was not advanced because it wound up being not just the making permanent of this change but the increase as well by another 20 cents, and that seemed to have a downturn for particularly the Omaha economy. I would ask for the adoption of the cigarette and tobacco products portion of the committee amendment. I'd have to say, by the way, that this is essentially the provisions with some adjustment with respect to the 2 cents that was in the green copy of the bill. But it is, I think, an area of great agreement between Senator Brashear and a working majority of the committee. I also think it would be the will of this body to do the same thing, and I ask for the adoption of this portion of the committee amendment. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Landis. You've heard the opening on FA1326. The first person to speak on the amendment would be Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the body. First of all, I rise to support the first part of this amendment, of the committee amendment, but I wanted to speak a little bit more on the whole bill that Senator Brashear has introduced. And I guess to put the bottom line first, I'd urge
