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bill. But the property tax portion of Senator Brashear's plan is problematic, in my opinion, and problematic I think probably when this is all over in the opinion of many other people. That's kind of the crucial, critical element as I see it. Senator Brashear, if the property tax provisions go down and all that's left of this bill...I shouldn't say all that's left because it would be very, very significant, but what was left of this bill is what is currently in the committee amendment, plus or minus a few tens of millions, my question is this. Are you going forward with a bill in that condition, and will you go forward to Final Reading and pass a bill in that condition, or does the people's plan stop at that point and the Revenue Committee has to come up with a new plan for revenues? And in conjunction with that, should this plan not be enough in whatever its condition, my question to you, Senator Landis, would be what is the plan for supplemental...for offering to the body a supplemental revenue bill to at least offer to the body the ability to come up to the \$360 million that has been the judgment of the Appropriations Committee? So with that, Senator Brashear, I would like to ask you directly at this time, should all...should any significant portion of the people's plan be defeated, but should the cigarette tax and perhaps some other revenue increasing measures be approved by the body, do we have your commitment to go through with the bill through Final Reading and provide to the body whatever revenues have been provided in your bill? How are we going to coordinate these two things? This is...I, obviously, don't want the mainline appropriations bill held hostage to anyone's bill at any point in time in the process, and I know, Senator, you would never do that, but could you tell us exactly how this would work in your mind?

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Brashear, will you yield, please?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, Mr. Speaker. Can you tell me how much time I have?

SPEAKER BROMM: It took three minutes to ask the question. You have a minute and a half to answer it. (Laughter)

SENATOR BRASHEAR: It's great technique. Thank you. Senator
