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problem that we have had has been that we have not had an adequate revenue source. We have lost very important revenue sources in the state of Nebraska, and I think we can't approach things like we need more taxes or I won't vote for any more taxes. I think we have to assess what it is that we need to operate the kind of a state that we can be proud of. Now, as I mentioned, our committee has been meeting. We have gone through item by item; tried to cut those things that anybody could consider as superfluous, and I'm, in a sense, sorry that we're talking about revenue before you have the opportunity to see what we have gone through to see what the needs are within the state. But I think it's most important that we structure our revenue so that we can accomplish these means. I don't think that any of us want to come back here in four months and say, okay, we have to have another special session in order to meet the obligations of the state because things have gone down. I know I talked to our Governor about a month ago and he asked how we were getting along with the Appropriations Committee and I said, well, it's pretty tough. And he says, well, it will be even tougher because I think the Forecasting Board is going to be down. And I said, I think, Governor, that it's going to continue to be down until we have an adequate source of revenue. So that's what we're talking about today and that's why I'm pleased that Senator Brashear has brought something to us for us to consider. I'm impressed by the blue sheet. I'm glad to have kind of a reasonable color this time by Senator Brashear. But at least with this blue sheet I was interested because I've received communications generally from various interest groups saying, don't do this, how can you do that to us, our particular group? Well, I think it's interesting on page, whatever, page 3 of this that some of the proposals that Senator Brashear has made are not proposals that are unusual. They're proposals that, by and large, are used by neighboring states. It seems like nobody wants to talk about any increased revenue if it's...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.
