money were to be raised and applied to healthcare costs that came into being as a result of smoking cigarettes and using tobacco products, that's one thing. This money is like a treasure-trove and it's being used for all kinds of things that have no relationship whatsoever to health, have no relationship whatsoever to the common good; that means, the good of the citizens throughout this state at large. So what is to be done on this amendment? I know what you're going to do. You're going to vote it down. I'm not going to lose sleep over anything you do on this bill at this stage. I can reel it in on Select File. I don't believe it has 33 votes. And if you keep crossing me like you're doing here and you're telling me that not everything is on the table, I have to tell you that I don't like being fibbed to, and I think people have been telling some fibs. They've been saying things that are not true. But because I give people the benefit of the doubt and I had no reason, other than 12 or 13 or 14 or 15, to believe that they don't tell the truth, I accepted what they were saying as the truth; that everything is on the table, meaning that while we have to engage in cuts here, there, and everywhere and consider raising revenue, there can be no sacred cows, none of those items which will be deemed untouchable. But they are out there, and by "they," I mean some untouchable items. And I'm calling attention to some of them by affirmative votes of the Legislature. I'm not going to withdraw any of these. I want everybody on record so that when we get to the point of talking about the budget bill my long memory is going to come into play, and it doesn't have to be too long because we only have about a month of legislative days left. My colleagues have a way of falling into the doldrums. If it's an issue in which they are not tremendously interested or involved, they don't see it as having any relationship to things that they will be excited about, that they will be involved in. But again, I look at the whole session as one entity. All things have some degree of relationship to other things. As you vote and show me that not everything is on the table, you're freeing me from a self-imposed obligation that I had assumed, which was going to cause me to vote for some things that...
