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they're doing, or at least to exist unmolested by legislative scrutiny, and saying we ought to look at it? And the way to make people pay most attention is to strike it; then listen as we hear the justification given for putting it back. If the justification is shown, I would support putting it back. But if we're not even going to put it before the body...and by "it," I mean the issue of this ITIF...if we're not going to put that before the body, there will not be the consideration given that ought to be. I don't believe that when people came here today they expected this kind of discussion, so they're not up for it. That's a term in athletics. When you're up for something, that means you're ready to play, you've reached that edge, you're going to do your best. In the Legislature, if you look at the agenda and you don't see appropriations bills, you're not up. You see Senator Brashear's the people's bill, and the name of it makes you say, oh my goodness, I don't want to talk about that. And sure enough, when I came here this morning and listened, nobody really wanted to talk about it. Oh, they talked about it, but they did not talk about it. And that's what I want to force us to do. I will have done my job. But I don't think the rest of us...I mean, the rest of you all, who don't vote with me, are doing the job you ought to do. Obviously, when I offer an amendment in all seriousness, I believe it's an amendment that ought to be adopted. I've thought about it, and I believe it fits in with what we're down here to do. I won't ask for a show of hands, but I'll ask rhetorically. How many in here think that the appropriations bill that comes before us is going to survive intact? And how many think, if it does, the problem is solved? How many think Senator Brashear's people's bill, people's revenue plan, the PRP, how many think the PRP is going to survive intact? And if it does, and the appropriations bill, will those two things together solve all of our problems? I'd like to ask Senator Wehrbein a question, because this is one I think he can answer.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Wehrbein, if the bill that the Appropriations Committee sends to us survives intact and Senator
