Brashear's people's revenue plan survives intact, will those two things, as they are now, solve our revenue problems?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I'm not clear at this point what Senator Brashear's bill will raise. If you consider a gap that we have of \$360 million, I don't know how close his proposed amendment comes. The committee amendment that we're talking about right now will not, as I understand it. But I don't know what Senator Brashear's amendment will do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. I would like to ask Senator Brashear a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you respond, Senator Brashear, to a question from Senator Chambers? Senator Brashear?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, Mr. President.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Brashear, if your bill, as finally amended in the most favorable form, is enacted into law, how much money will it bring in?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: In round numbers, and approximately, Senator Chambers, it would do \$300 million for the biennium.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now...thank you. I'd like to ask Senator Wehrbein a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Wehrbein, if that happens, and the appropriations bill with the cuts and whatever else is in it should be put before us and survives intact, would those two take care of our financial problem?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, if my mathematics is right, we'd be about nine...or \$60 million short, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Still short. So what are we going to do?
