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SENATOR CHAMBERS: So that means the cigarette tax would be reduced by 28 cents?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I think it would be 30, because there's 2 cents also designated to 309.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So this then is not one of those situations where the 28 cents would be there to be used for other purposes. Is that true?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: That's right. That's right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. I'd like to ask Senator Brashear a question, if he's here.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Brashear, are you available for a question?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I see him scurrying, or scampering, or making haste. Let me use some dignified terminology.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Brashear, will you yield?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, Mr. President.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Brashear, I'm on page 5 of the committee amendment, and I'm working with lines 3 through 6. And I would like to strike language which would say that after October 1, 2004, if you don't strike the language, this 28 cents will cease going into the Cash Reserve Fund. What Senator Wehrbein explained is, if this language remains as it is now, that is not 28 cents that will be available for use after October 1, 2004; that is money that will go away, which I guess means from the tax. And he mentioned 2 other cents. But let's deal with this. Was it your understanding that after October 1, 2004, the cigarette tax would be reduced by 28 cents?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: No, it was not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let me ask Senator Wehrbein a question, so
