SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: And what he is proposing is a new amendment. So I wanted (inaudible)...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right. To pick it up...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yeah.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and take that same 28 cents and put it someplace else.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Right. But...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...I was quoting present law.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right. I was crystal clear on what you said, Senator Wehrbein. And what I am trying to do with all that I'm talking about is to call our attention to what the law is, what is being proposed, and that if some money ceases to be used for a certain purpose, that money is going to be picked up, not subtracted from the existing cigarette tax. But Senator Brashear, in his people's revenue plan, is claiming that money. And after October 1, 2004, since it no longer is going into the rainy day fund, it will be going into the General Fund. Senator Brashear is ready now.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'd like to ask him that question on where that language is.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Brashear, you may continue.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Chambers, you're referencing, as I understand it...I'm on the committee amendment, lines 12 and 13. If you'll go to line 22: Commencing October 1, 2004, the State Treasurer shall place the equivalent of forty-nine cents of such tax less three million
