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be passed, we can revisit all of these items. Senator Redfield, I'd like to ask you a question, because you can answer this. I'm just going to ask for a name of something.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Redfield, would you yield?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What do they call that kind of budgeting when each these agencies start out with nothing and they have to justify the amount that they want? What is that called?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Zero-based budgeting.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Z-B-B, ZBB, I like these "anacronyms," or are they anachronisms, or acronyms? At any rate, this could be considered a form of that in this limited area, where we have given carte blanche, so to speak, to each one of these programs to take this money and do as it will. Even though some cursory glancing at what they're doing can be done, the Legislature doesn't really exercise oversight nor are they called to account. Not one of these programs, to my knowledge, in all of the years that they have been in existence have ever been touched, and this session Game and Parks might be, but that is not completed yet. So, as you vote against my amendment, as you must, I hope you will pay very close attention to Senator Quandahl's offering. It makes a lot of sense. It will give some roughage to this bill. How much time do I have, Mr. President?

SENATOR CUDABACK: You have about a minute two.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, can I give up the time that I have left and then close when I'm recognized?

SENATOR CUDABACK: You may. Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Mr. President, members, I'm (inaudible) what you want to do, Senator Chambers, and I'm going to...I guess I'll vote against it. I don't...I'm not necessarily opposed to what you're doing. I'm just not clear at this point whether
