money, well needed in the General Fund, and the terms will work out some time, or whether we're using Cash Reserve and/or...if I'm convinced that things are not...we're in the trough and not moving up, I think we ought to keep the Cash Reserve fairly high. I just don't know what that number should be, so I just want you to understand I'm voting against it, but it's not a permanent vote. (Laugh) Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator. Senator Raikes.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you, Mr. President, members. Senator Wehrbein, if I could ask you a question, how much...how much money, if the Appropriations Committee has dealt with this issue, how much money would be left in the Cash Reserve with the committee's plan?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, Mr. President, members. We used...oh, I can't remember, 20...just under \$100 million, I believe. We used a little bit the other night. I'm kind of...

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay, so...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...a blank, frankly, but...

SENATOR RAIKES: ...according to the Appropriations Committee's plan then, the...well, I'm probably premature in this. Your spending proposal would require, as I understand it and...roughly \$360 million of additional revenue. Is that correct?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR RAIKES: If there were \$360 million of additional revenue and your spending, or yours, the Appropriations Committee's plan were adopted, what would be the projected balance in the Cash Reserve?
