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tells me where those current earmarks go? And that's what I did. Our current Nebraska cigarette tax earmarks are on the handout that I have right there. One cent a pack for the Nebraska Outdoor Recreation Development Cash Fund, that would go away under my amendment. Three cents a pack for the Department of Health and Human Services to carry out Neb. Rev. Stat. Section 81, and then what that is, just so that there's no misunderstanding, is that's cancer research. That's cancer research at Creighton University and the University of Nebraska. So when I say this is strong medicine, it truly is. Seven cents a pack for the Building Renewal Allocation Fund would go away under my amendment. Three million dollars a year for the Municipal Infrastructure Redevelopment Fund, the MIRF funds, that was one of the amendments that Senator Chambers had this morning. Two cents a pack for the Information Technology Infrastructure Fund; a million dollars a year for the City of Primary Class Redevelopment Fund, that's Lincoln; \$1,000,500 (sic) a year for the City of the Metropolitan Class Redevelopment Fund, that's Omaha; 28 cents a pack for the Cash Reserve Fund, that was a discussion that we had just a little bit earlier. Instead of going into the Cash Reserve Fund, all of those funds, that 28 cents, would go into the General Fund under the amendment that's before. And then finally the Capital Construction Fund, and it's a little bit of a calculation that goes there. I tried to put together a little bit of an illustration based on 100 million packs of cigarettes, the taxes that would be generated by them, which just for ease sake comes up to \$64 million. If you look on the bottom line of this particular amendment is, under the current cigarette tax scheme, money to General Fund is about \$17,500,000; money to earmarked projects under the current cigarette tax scheme is approximately \$46,500,000. If this amendment is adopted, and I do urge its adoption, the General Fund would receive all of that \$64 million. So these are rough numbers. It's just an example. It's not set in stone or anything like that, but I think I've laid out what this amendment does. It's not going to be easy to adopt an amendment of this sort, but, likewise, I think from some of the discussion that was generated previously, not only on the concept of an amendment like this but also with some of the amendments that Senator Chambers had previously, this isn't easy but it begins us the process of prioritizing our state
