SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Wehrbein, you have 2 minutes and 40 seconds.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members. Am I next after this?

SPEAKER BROMM: Yes, you are.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you. I'm just not going to repeat what Senator Beutler and Senator Schimek said, because they made their points well. I just wanted to call the body's attention to the fact if there's questions on what some of these individual funds are allocated for. I was going to go into them in great detail, but I decided that I probably didn't need to. But suffice it to say in a perfect world, if we were starting over, I would not necessarily be in favor of the earmarks either. These started back in 1971 that we first earmarked proceeds from cigarette tax, and it was done for specific purposes, and if I...my memory would be right, Devaney Center probably would be one. And since we've move on and with construction, the Nebraska Construction Fund has been used, and if you've read this thoroughly, that has now expired. We're no longer doing any construction this year. Normally, we affirm this to the construction...to finish construction projects. Those are all over and now it is reverted back to the General Fund per the law. So we have the issues of the Recreation Fund, the cancer research that certainly many people in the past have felt that was important based on the potential cause by cigarettes. And the Building Renewal Allocation Fund, 309, which is still stuck in my memory, of 7 cents, we went through this in the late eighties and nineties where we...and early nineties where we had gotten down to as low as a million dollars in 309 Fund. And when we...one of the reasons it was taken out of the hand of individual agencies is when you get into the squeezes like we are right now, building and maintenance suffered greatly. And when you have a program to do and you have a building, you put programs first. This is an effort, albeit moderate in some people's mind, but at least it's a base start to try to keep somewhat ongoing with our infrastructure in
