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to, the mud flats, that was the...that was that section. You know, and we all looked for a possible place for funds to be diverted. And I see nothing wrong with the city of Omaha at that time asking for them...for those funds to be diverted there. We're all guilty of trying to move dollars like these into our own districts for a purpose that we feel is very important. And I remember when we were discussing this bill, I wanted to divert some of those dollars to the Johnson Lake project, which was a project we wanted in my district. I thought that was just as important as the sewer infrastructure in north Omaha. That was a project that Senator Chambers fought to get help and relief for; very worthwhile project. But here we are, we're locking those dollars up until the year 2016. Those funds were coming from the Omaha Civic Center, and that was ending, and they were just diverted a little bit further north for that sewer project, which was a special project in Omaha, very worthwhile. Maybe we...you know, and if revenue sources are something that we need to be looking at, there are several revenue sources out there. And I don't want to belabor the issue of where we could get some extra revenue, but that would certainly cover what we're taking away here. And most of these projects, or most of these ideas will probably be looked at again. And as far as offering amendments...this is the last...probably the last amendment that we will see on this...I don't...the Clerk is shaking his head, oh no. Well, there are probably more coming. But anyway, this is my idea to divert these funds back and take them away from the city of Omaha. And with that, that's all it does. I...the hour is getting late, and I don't want to belabor you too much. So...and I'm sure there will be some gnashing of teeth on this amendment also, like there has been the rest. That's my idea. I didn't want to leave anything unturned. I wanted to cover most of it. So with that, I would support your...hopefully you would see yourselves fit to support this worthwhile amendment. Thank you.
