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that I believe in. Now, you can strip it away, and we can continue the learning process. I will then demonstrate how you effectively restore a project which you feel is important. So if you all want that lesson, strip it away. I don't even care. Senator Quandahl said we...this is a long day. This is not a long day. This is not even the beginning. Wait until we start staying here and you cannot see any daylight coming in. Wait till you see people visibly slumped in their chairs. And then see me, like a phoenix rising from the ashes, growing stronger as we go longer. See, I will play hardball. I will tell you, if you take this from me, be ready for me to take something from you. And what can I take from you? Time, time, time is what I can and will take. If you want to trade a special session for this, do it. Challenge me. Put me to the test, and see if I'm just one of these blowhard politicians who's full of hot air and will make all of these statements in the heat of an emotional moment, then as soon as I leave, the ardor cools, my determination goes away, and I fade away with it. That will not happen. I welcome challenges. I had stated earlier, in response to a question, that this was not one of the projects I would try to remove. But I said anybody who sees something that they think ought to be attacked, offer an amendment in the way that I'm offering amendments. And that's what Senator Janssen has chosen to do. I don't begrudge him having done that. I'm not upset with him for having done that. I'm not offended. And if you vote with him, I am not upset, I am not offended. It just means, Senator Mines, that we don't just use conventional weapons in the struggle anymore. I have been released to use weapons of mass destruction. And I know how to do that, mass and massive. That's not a threat. I wouldn't want anybody to interpret it that way. It is a simple, forthright statement of the fact that in the legislative process, things happen, things are attempted. And if we suffer a setback, we have to learn how to right ourselves, dust ourselves off, start all over again, and reclaim that which apparently was lost. No vote taken today is permanent. No vote is final. So on Senator Janssen's amendment, I will not vote with him, because I stated earlier that this is a project on which I place a high priority. I state that. I will make my position known.
