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I just wanted to signal my intent to do that on Select File if this bill does advance to that point. And I will also address the portion of LB 759 which deals with income taxes. And the reason I will is because the Speaker and the federal government have put a claim on my time, so I'm not going to be here all day, and I want to have an opportunity to speak on that part of it. Again when you look at the impact upon your economy of raising your income tax rates, you know that that is the most significant tax that you can address in really reducing the stimulus on your economy. It's not about whether we're just trying to hit the rich because, in fact, in the state of Nebraska, you are at the top tax rate, if you're single, at \$26,500.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: One minute.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Now I don't know if you call that rich but most Nebraskans don't call that rich. And so, in fact, when we talk about raising our rates on income tax, we're talking about putting it on pretty low-income people who are just scraping to get by with the necessities of life. Try being single, try making that rate, try paying your rent, keeping an automobile on the road, putting food on your table, you make just enough that you don't qualify for aid, but not enough to really get by. So I am reluctant to go there on the income tax rate. But I certainly think that we need to look at restructuring and I think that we need fairly to look at this. We need to look at the alcohol tax. We need to look at all of these pieces. As I said, we need to put everything on the table and discuss it. I am going to consider whether I could do this. I find it difficult to do because we have hit this population group last year. Had we done it once and had we done it at this rate last year, I would have done that.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Time has expired.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you.
