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SENATOR LOUDEN: Thank you, Senator Cudaback and members of the body. As I looked this amendment over, I guess, I think Senator Schrock says it's asking more questions than answers. I have several questions that I'm kind of concerned about. I understand the part where the tax, sales tax would be exempt on animals and what it looks like is that if it's something you can kill and eat, why it's tax free. And they mentioned cows, pigs, and chickens. What Senator Landis I don't think realizes that you don't have rabbits in there and turkeys and something like that. So right off the bat, we have a place in there that somebody is going to be able to work around onto that thing. And it works in the same way in the construction part. I have a question, when we're talking about construction, it's been mostly on are we constructing buildings or what are we constructing. What happens with our...a telephone co-op someplace, if they want to rebuild their telephone lines? This is construction. Do they have to pay sales tax on the construction work on that? And I was wondering, would Senator Brashear answer a question for me, if he would, please.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield to a question, Senator Brashear?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, Mr. President.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Senator, on the construction part in this, in these amendments and in this bill, does this take into account construction work on electric power lines or telephone lines or, perhaps, if I wanted to build a road into the ranch or something like that, is that all something that would be sales taxed?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Power lines, as a specific example, Senator, are exempt.

SENATOR LOUDEN: You're wrong, Senator. Co-ops pay property tax.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: On our...if you look at AM1447, which is to follow; (f) the construction, repair or annexation of any structure used for the generation or transmission of
