you to do that. I wish I could have shown it here. I understand it's not the proper way to do it. And I apologize for that. But please come back and look at it. And then, Senator Brashear, do you have the yellow sheet you handed out earlier?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: The sheet shows...I'm looking at the one on who taxes snack foods. And you have the states of Wyoming, South Dakota...well, you have all of the states around us taxing snack foods. But four of those states you're listing all of the snack foods, and then in parentheses you've got, all food taxed. So really it's totally a completely different situation in those four states. Everything is taxed. It doesn't even compare to what we would have to do if we did with what your proposal says. Now to go over to the state of Colorado. You've got down that we tax...they tax gum. Can you tell me, do they tax all gum, or is that just in vending machines?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: It's my understanding that they tax all gum.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: And what about soft drinks?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: The same.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Okay. I can't answer the question on gum in Colorado. But I will tell you, in Nebraska we do tax gum in vending machines. In soft drinks for Nebraska...in Colorado, it's for immediate consumption only. You've got it down as soft drinks that's taxed, but it's for immediate consumption only. And we don't...and we also do that same thing in Nebraska, but you don't have it listed in Nebraska. So the only state on this whole map that would even compare...that there's any argument that you would have, is Iowa. That would be the only state. And yet, this map tries to make it look like we're way out of compliance with every other state around us. Would you agree with that? Or what would you say to that?
