SENATOR CUDABACK:      Thank you, Senator McDonald.      Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS:      Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature, I did most of my speaking yesterday on this bill while it's on General File. I just want to remind everybody that you're saving up everything for Select File. And there are a lot of things in this bill that I intend to discuss, and I will discuss them for as long as I need to discuss them. I will offer amendments. I will offer motions. And you may as well get ready for it, and some will sit back and not do anything because they figure that in the course of my dealing with the bill, as I think it should be dealt with, perhaps what their concerns are will be covered. But don't count on that. I'm not going to do everybody's work for everybody all the time. Some people will be happy just to have this bill moved one time, and that's all right. But I'm not going to waste my time on General File because I want you all to build a bed in which you all must lie, in which you all shall lie. It is foolish, in my opinion, as an observer of the Legislature and one with a modicum of knowledge about how the Legislature functions, especially toward the end of a session, it is foolish to send a bill with all this stuff in it to Select File and expect to get anything other than chaos when you get there. But I thrive on chaos. That is my milieu. And I'm not creating the chaos, you all are. You all are doing it. You didn't adopt any of my amendments. So everything wrong with this bill, you all contrived to put it there. As for my colleagues who talked about taxing what they call junk food, they will have a fight from me on that. And if Senator Baker tries to attach his bill, his amendment to tax food to this bill, then you haven't seen a number of amendments that seems to stretch from here to infinity. I'm telling Senator Brashear right now that if Senator Baker makes a sincere and serious attempt to use this bill to tax food, I'm going to pull all, well, not all the stops. That's not necessary.
