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revenue as to how these things are applied in those jurisdictions where we're attempting to mirror their example. They exempt new construction. Now we're attempting to or we are exempting new construction and we're trying to merge together the idea of remodeling and repair and the like. And so that's where it comes from and I cannot tell you what the fiscal impact is at this time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Is it believed that there would be a significant fiscal impact?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: We don't understand it to be significant. There will be some impact, of course.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Did these particular provisions, did they come from a group, or did they come from Department of Revenue, or whose ideas are these?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: No, most of this mirrors regulation in Kansas.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, thank you very much.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: That was our source, one of the sources but, no, I want to affirmatively state they didn't come from some group lobbying us on the issue.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you. Senator Connealy.

SENATOR CONNEALY: Thank you, Mr. President, members. I'd rise in support of this amendment. It further defines the bill and I think that we need to do that. It's a very complicated law and I appreciate Senator Brashear doing that. In particular, I'm in support of the public power recognition here, and we recognize when things are destroyed by a natural disaster. Further down the line I'm going to offer more...another amendment that would further define this part. But I do support the amendment and I think that this will help the bill.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Connealy. Senator Chambers.
