SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Raikes, I'd like to continue my discussion with you from many speakers ago, and you've probably forgotten what I was even talking about. And, by the way, if you'd like to finish the comment you were just making, I'd certainly be interested in hearing the rest of that.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Raikes.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you, Senator Bromm. I think I was simply making the point that recently the structural change to add a considerable amount of state aid to reduce property taxes via LB 806 is one that in a sense we're second guessing at this point because we didn't come up with an additional revenue stream at the...or it turns out we didn't have enough revenue stream at the state level to continue to support that. But I think that was the end of my point, Senator Beutler, but thank you.

SENATOR BEUTLER: And I might add to that we reduced the income tax at that particular point in time, thinking we didn't need the revenue stream, but now we're finding out we do, in fact, need that revenue stream. But the question I wanted to go back to, Senator Raikes, was my confusion with regard to the situation where teachers may have negotiated with a school district some time ago, reached an agreement with them that quite possibly, in the effort to improve teachers' salaries, was above and beyond the salary increases that one might expect one
