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transportation for free and reduced students. And I don't know if you remember the earlier conversation, but the bill we passed last year, whenever it was, required that schools would need to provide admission to spectator events and transportation for free and reduced students, or students on free and reduced lunch. That proved to be basically an unworkable provision so that part is dropped. That requirement on the part of school districts is no longer there.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Is that through the outright repeal of one of these sections? Is that where that takes place?

SENATOR RAIKES: I'll try to get an answer for you on that, Senator Beutler. If I could, though, mention that the bill goes in the other direction in a couple of ways. One of them, it makes it clear that for curricular activities, minor and personal or consumable items, personal and consumable items cannot be required of students. They can be requested but not required. And similarly, materials that...for courses where the material would be I don't know if consumed is the right word, but become the property, the course output, if you will, would become the property of the student, again, the school can request that the student provide those materials but not require them. And these were to address...these changes were to address a couple of situations that appeared whereby, for example, a minor and...or personal and consumable item for a class might say involved a 150 dollar calculator for a math class. And that was clearly not consistent with the free education or free instruction interpretation by the committee. So those changes went in that direction. The change, as I mentioned, on spectator admissions and transitions or, excuse me, transportation is page 4, lines 14 through 16.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I see, okay. Senator, thank you for your explanation.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Hartnett, followed by Senator Stuhr.
