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SENATOR QUANDAHL: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Members of the body, I also rise to be very complimentary of Senator Preister for bringing quite a few diverse groups together and working very hard on getting the bill to where it is today too. I do...I guess I also understood and I heard through the grapevine and directly from some people that there may be some additional exemptions dealing with developmental disabilities, welfare, or childcare services that may need to be addressed later on. But also, I also heard, in the spirit of cooperation, Senator Preister saying that if we move it along he'd be willing to address that or at least take a look at perhaps bringing it back from Final and addressing it at that time too. And so with that, again, I would thank Senator Preister for being so cooperative in that regard, and then also I would give Senator Preister the rest of my time to address these two issues.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Preister, did you care to use his time?

SENATOR PREISTER: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Quandahl. Yes, I will state it again and Senator Byars is working with his concerns that I think are legitimate concerns and, although I haven't seen any specific language, I would prefer to take our time and to be deliberative. That's not to say that we still can't do that today, but Senator Byars will make that determination. If we do it today, we can discuss it; if we wait and sit down so we all understand what we're doing, rather than making a quick judgment. I'd prefer to be more deliberative but we can do it either way and I do pledge that I'm willing to work on it either now or on Final Reading and bring it back for that amendment. So either way is fine with me, and I will leave that up to Senator Byars to discuss with me and help me to make that final decision. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Preister and Senator Quandahl. Did you wish to have your time back, Senator Quandahl? He waives his time. Senator Friend.

SENATOR FRIEND: Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature, I more or less should...I rise in support, I believe, of the amendment. I just had some questions. And I
