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weapon again under any circumstances because it's against the law to do so once you're found guilty of a felony. This regulates who shall carry firearms, something that is now unregulated except for the provisions of 28-1202. And 28-1202...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR TYSON: ...again, as I have mentioned, allows an affirmative defense, which means that you are guilty and charged and brought to trial and you'll be free if you can prove to the satisfaction, the highly subjective satisfaction, of the court and/or the jury that you were reasonable and prudent in carrying a concealed weapon. This does away with that. And when you have a concealed carry permit you lose the protection, if there is any, and I don't believe there is, of 28-1202. This is a sound, well-thought-out, well-written bill and when it comes...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR TYSON: ...to vote to...on recommitting it to committee, I would suggest that we turn that down. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Tyson. Senator Mines. Excuse me, Senator Mines. We have an announcement first.

ASSISTANT CLERK: Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Schrock would like to announce that the Natural Resources Committee will be holding an Executive Session under the north balcony at 11:00 this morning; that's Natural Resources, 11:00, north balcony.

You know, I guess I agree with Senator Schimek. She stated that there may not be 33 votes in this body to invoke cloture, and maybe it's time we pull that trigger, and
