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16 percent. So...and again, I am not a great believer in statistics. I know we have statistics on both sides of this issue that are compelling. However, I do like to talk in terms of outcomes. I know that there are many things that we are afraid of, but when we're talking 45 out of 50 other states that actually have this, they've enacted it, they are working within the confines of those regulations, I think it's very important to talk about actual outcomes. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Combs. Senator Chambers. And, Senator Chambers, this is your third time on this motion.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature, Senator Combs gave the least...the argument with the least merit of any that I've heard on the floor, and that's saying something in view of what Senator Tyson said. If somebody told me that three out of four drivers in California have run over children, I'm not going to let Senator Combs tell me, well, we got to do something about these cars in Omaha because that means three out of the four people in them are going to run over children so we got to get the cars off the road. She wouldn't do that. Now, if I gave her a statistic that said three out of the four of the people who were carrying these concealed weapons have killed people, she'd say, well, that's in that state; that doesn't tell us what's going to happen here. So the people who support this legislation never have any sound arguments that relate to here, which is what we're talking about. Here is Nebraska. The attitude of the people in this state in opposition to this bill very well could be based on how they've seen guns handled that were legal, because they may know people who, until they committed a gun crime, were themselves law-abiding citizens. Many people who become criminals have the experience of their first criminal act being committed with a gun, and often it is committed against a family member, then an acquaintance, then a neighbor or somebody with whom they have regular contact. So the so-called law-abiding citizens often kill or maim other law-abiding citizens whom they know or with whom they are acquainted. So Senator Combs' talk about what happens in Texas is a poor argument for anything. This bill is a political document. I repeat, I'm a politician, Senator Combs, and I'm going to do
