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compensation benefits to individuals who were volunteer firefighters and had been injured. We had tried to find every conceivable way we could think of to say what we meant, then emphasize that we meant what we had said. Senator Hudkins felt that that had been achieved in the present form of her bill. Well, if she thinks that this amendment of Senator Beutler's is more important than her bill, that's all right with me. Because volunteer firefighters don't ever talk to me about anything, so the only thing I know about this situation is what I hear expressed when we're operating in...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...that Business and Labor Committee. I'm not going to waste a lot of time on the bill today. They can bring it back. They can add the amendment. Then they can send it on. But I will put some amendments on the bill that will make sure that we discuss it further. When a bill is returned to Select File, the amendment that is to be attached cannot be divided or anything else. You either take it or you leave it. So this is one which, if the body decides to take, I will begin crafting my amendments to make sure that the bill does not progress in the ordinary course of events to be read. It's going to be debated at great length. And it will be debated on Final Reading, which is where it will be found. Thank you, Mr. President. But I want to make this one other comment. You get to make the motion to return it. Whether you succeed or not is irrelevant. You can move to reconsider,...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...or you can do any of a number of things. But time will be taken on the bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Vrtiska.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body. I rise in support of the amendment, and based on the fact that I think this is a policy question more than anything, and that policy is whether an employee should be able to sue for the same injury in more than one state. Now, if that is the case, then
