things that come out will show the public exactly the mentality we're dealing with when we come across those people who will say that society will be better, civilization will be improved when people are walking around with pistols hidden inside of their clothes. Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Your light is next, Senator Chambers. You may continue.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Members of the Legislature and Mr. President, I'm looking at AM0768 which is the committee amendment as adopted. And on page 13, Section 18, starting in line 17, it talks about all of the places where a concealed weapon cannot be carried: A county sheriff, county attorney, or the Attorney General, as appro...oh, wait a minute. I'm on the wrong page. I had turned two pages. This is my time. In the same way that Senator Tyson tap-dances, sometimes I have to take a little time to collect my thoughts. On page 10, Section 12, starting in line 17. "A permit holder may carry a concealed handgun anywhere in Nebraska, except any: Police, sheriff, or Nebraska State Patrol station or office." How will a determination be made as to whether a person is carrying a concealed weapon? Will everybody who comes to one of these facilities be patted down or pass through a metal detector? The next place: a detention facility, prison, or jail. If a person is not a permit holder, may he or she carry a concealed weapon in these locations? That remains to be worked out, because the bill is poorly drafted, may by implication allow that which is not prohibited specifically to be done. The concealed weapon cannot be carried into a courtroom or building which contains a courtroom; cannot be carried to a polling place during a bona fide election; meeting of the governing body of a county, public school district, municipality, or other political subdivision; meeting of the Legislature or a committee of the Legislature. I say, again, are metal detectors going to be implicitly authorized and almost mandated by this language? How will a financial institution know that somebody is not carrying a concealed weapon? Let's say that the financial institution has a metal detector or the security guard sees the handle of a pistol when the person's coat flops open, how is the security
