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guard going to disarm that person? I'd like to ask Senator Tyson a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Tyson, are you available? Senator Tyson. Are you available, Senator Tyson?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, I don't see him. That's all right. Here's the thing, under this bill a police officer, a game and parks conservation officer, an emergency services personnel individual can relieve a person of a pistol. There is nothing in this bill that authorizes a security guard to disarm a permit holder.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if the individual walked into the bank with a pistol, which is against the law, I suppose that somebody in the bank will have to dial 911. And if it becomes evident to this person carrying the pistol that a call like that has been made and he or she decides to leave the building, is the security guard going to interpose himself or herself between that individual and the door? And if so, will there be an angry argument that could escalate into one or the other being shot? Well, those who support this bill don't even care about that because they are pandering to the lowest element in fearful, terrified people in this state. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Thompson, on the motion to recommit.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. Just want to review some of the things that we've been talking about with regard to this bill for the last few times it has come up. I think we've discovered lots of flaws with the bill itself that we may or may not be able to get to. Some of them are contained in Senator Tyson's amendment, but a lot of the fundamental problems for your local sheriffs and for law enforcement, there is no amendment that can help with that. And that has to do with who they have to issue to. This is a "shall" issue bill. They shall issue the permit, and they have to make a number of subjective decisions which they don't have
