law enforcement officers. But I think when they make one of these contacts with a person who has a concealed weapon, that officer should be in uniform. These are some of the types of things that were not considered by Senator Tyson and the others who support this bill, but I want them as a matter of record so people will see how flawed and incomplete this proposed legislation is. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Schimek, and this will be your third time, Senator.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members. You know, Senator Tyson, you and I have really had some good times with this bill and it hasn't all been real serious conversation or debate. And, Senator Tyson, I think you probably remember the other day when you asked me if I wouldn't come to your defense if you were under attack, and I said, no. Well, I've changed my mind, Senator Tyson. I would come to your defense if you promise never to introduce such a ridiculous bill as this again. And you can respond if you would like, Senator Tyson.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Tyson.

SENATOR TYSON: May I respond to that, Senator Cudaback?

SENATOR CUDABACK: You may if she permits you to.

SENATOR TYSON: We may have the basis of a deal here, Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: If we vote...

SENATOR TYSON: The thing of it is, you would also have to vote for the bill and then you would have to tell me how you're going to defend me, because I don't think talking is going to do it. I think you're going to have to have something else.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: (Laugh) Okay. Well, thank you, Senator Tyson. The next thing I'd like to say, and I really want to make a point of this, this morning, at some point in time I was
