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SENATOR BOURNE: One last question, Senator Jensen. Did you hear the situation that Senator Tyson talked about with...I think it was a shooting up there at the...was it at the Norfolk Center or Lincoln Regional Center?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes. At the Norfolk Center.

SENATOR BOURNE: At the...

SENATOR JENSEN: Was that a concealed carry?

SENATOR BOURNE: That's what I was going to ask you, Senator Jensen, if that was a concealed carry weapon that was used to wound that doctor, but you beat me to it. Senator Jensen, again, I appreciate your leadership in this area. I'm going to follow your recommendation and vote red on the Tyson amendment because I do appreciate the work you're doing here. And I know that if we don't get ahold of these costs and get ahold of them soon, they're just going to eat us up. So thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK PRESIDING

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bourne. Senator Thompson.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the body, I rise to oppose the Tyson amendment and to support Senator Jensen in this regard. This is a monumental undertaking that Senator Jensen is proposing and I appreciate his leadership on that. And one of the reasons I think it's absolutely critical, in addition to, as Senator Bourne said, the costs, is it's time for us to take a big picture look at our mental health system in Nebraska, and not only find efficiencies but also find ways that we serve people better and that are more appropriate in terms of what we know now about mental illness and the more we learn about mental illness. I come back to a phrase that's used often in government and it is, if you always do what you've always done, you'll always get what you always had. And I think we have to go into this knowing that if we were...had the ability to start with nothing and build a system that would be most effective and helpful for not only the people with mental illness but for their families, for the medical community and
