close it or we're not going to close it, or we're just going to have this just for certain patients that need to be housed there at that center, or what is the real intent of these boards?

SENATOR TYSON: Well, Senator Stuthman, the...number one, in direct answer to your question, they would not be the ones to say let's close or not close the regional centers, because that...the entire thing has to be developed. The purport of this amendment is very simply this: We have people with knowledge and interest in this problem and from the messages that I've gotten, maybe you've gotten an entirely different message, but the message that I've gotten is that they feel left out of this process. They have been spending anywhere from a couple of years to 20 or 25 years, 30 years involved in caring for the mentally ill, and now the Legislature, and I realize that...and you know, because you're down here now and you're part of the Legislature, you know that we never make a mistake. That's one of the joys of being perfect. They feel left out. And I was about to use the word disenfranchised, but they don't have a franchise in this. They're not electors, in that sense of the word. But they do feel that they have a contribution to make and the purport of this amendment is that we'll take it on a rational, organized basis to get their expertise. Now where did that come from? A number of years ago, when we were working on the Nebraska statewide wireless radio network, we went across the state taking sheriffs and people who were knowledgeable in radio, people who were knowledgeable in emergency management, and said, what is it that we need? What do you have...what now do we have to do to get that...those benefits available to everybody? And after a total of about five years we now...at least they're in the process of getting that system working. But the system itself was designed because of the knowledge of the people who were users. It's one thing to be an internationally known expert, as a member of the Unicameral of course, in all problems that come before us; it's another one to actually know what you're talking about. The people that I have listed here, the law enforcement, the mayors, the city administrators, the workers, they know what they're talking about. They don't have the whole picture, but they got a part of the picture, and that is...does that answer your question adequately, Senator?
