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SENATOR STUTHMAN:      Yes, that does, and thank you very much, Senator Tyson.

SENATOR CUDABACK:      One minute.

SENATOR STUTHMAN:      The thing that was brought to my attention when we were discussing this and when he was giving his introductory message on the amendment was the people that he had involved, and these are exactly the same groups and people that we had involved in the...into the consortium that developed the need for our community-based health department as a portion of our East Central Health Department at that time. These were the people that get together regular and we developed the needs and stuff like that as to which way to go. And we've had those people, you know, in the planning of what we are doing. The thing that really concerns me is what we're doing in our area, and we've cut it down to half the amount of EPCs that have to go up there, and I do not know what figure that is, but we're doing it without any money, any taxpayer money from the community. So this is a real concern.

SENATOR CUDABACK:      Time.

SENATOR STUTHMAN:      So thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK:      Thank you, Senator Stuthman. Senator Tyson, there are no further lights on. You're recognized to close on your amendment, AM1415.

SENATOR TYSON:      Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Members of the body, this last exchange between Senator Stuthman and myself I think illustrates something. Number one, I used the example that some of the people involved feel that they're left out, and I used the term disenfranchised. I have not talked to a law enforcement officer that was concerned about emergency protective custody since yesterday afternoon. These problems are confronting police. They are confronting sheriff's departments. They are con...it is an everyday occurrence. And the system never gets better. Now they are going to...we are going to have a mental health reform act that's phrased in very,
